Digital Humanities: New Tools & New Knowledge

A key aspect of the rapidly growing field of Digital Humanities is the application of computational tools to problems in humanistic research, a process which can lead to exciting new knowledge. In this lecture, I will explain how the recent development of machine learning algorithms has made it possible to investigate more fully insights based on a theory of meaning (distributional semantics) which is over 60 years old. I will illustrate this development with examples from my own research and from that of
